200th Anniversary of the Religious Sisters of Charity

2015 marks the 200th anniversary of the foundation of the Religious Sisters of Charity by Mary Aikenhead whose compassion for people in need led her to dedicate her life to providing orphanages, schools and hospitals for those people. She was joined by others and they went on to establish the order we know today as the Sisters of Charity.

Earlier this year, Mary Aikenhead was made Venerable by Pope Francis. On May 19th, a special mass was held in Our Lady of the Assumption Church, Walkinstown, to celebrate the work of Mary Aikenhead and the Sisters of Charity. Children from the four local schools were invited to take part in the Mass and they hung portraits of Mary Aikenhead and Edmund Rice, who founded the Christian Brothers, in an alcove in the church for permanent display. These portraits should remind us of the contribution to education made by the two congregations and encourage us to continue their work.

Green Schools

Last Thursday saw us all assemble at the front gate to raise the school's fourth Green School Flag. This flag was awarded for work on improving the ways we travel to school, making it more sustainable, less wasteful of fuel and less damaging to the environment.

Previous Green Flags were achieved for Reducing Litter and Waste, Conserving Energy and Conserving Water.

The teachers who coordinated the programme and the boys and girls from the Green Schools committee worked very hard during the year to achieve this award. A 7-step programme, involving all classes, was completed. The main focus was "Walk on Wednesday", known as W.O.W. As a result of W.O.W. many children, accompanied by their parents, now walk, cycle, scoot or use Park 'n' Stride to travel to school.

Our Green Code motto is

"Walk to school, save some fuel".

Uniforms

The Schoolwear House, suppliers of the uniform, will set up in the school Hall on Fri 19th and Sat 20th June to take orders or sell stock. They also have a permanent shop at the Walkinstown Roundabout, where the full uniform is available. Alternatively, the trousers, skirts, track suit bottoms, blouses and shirts can be bought in *Dunnes Stores* or *Penneys*.

For **Senior Infants** the uniform is a royal blue jumper or cardigan with the school crest, navy trousers, skirt or pinafore and a white shirt. A white airtex t-shirt and a crested track-suit is worn on PE day(s).

For **First & Second Classes**, the guidance about uniform remains the same as last year; girls who already had a red uniform may continue to wear it and anyone buying new items should get the blue/navy versions.

It would be very helpful if jumpers, track suit tops, jackets and lunch boxes were **labelled** clearly with your child's name as items often get left behind.

First Communion

The 2nd Class girls had a very exciting occasion as they made their First Communion on Saturday 16th May. The girls and their teachers, Mrs Gleeson and Miss Jennings, have been busy this year preparing for the sacrament.
